

PHYSICAL EDUCATION BLIZZARD BAGS FOR STUDENTS WHO COMPLETES
STANDARD 6 FIRST SEMESTER

REQUIREMENTS FOR 2 REACTION PAPERS
(THIS ASSIGNMENT IS FOR 3 DAY MAKE-UP)

When determining the topics for your reaction papers, you have a wide variety of choice. The articles are "Health-Related" topics. The topics may relate to fitness, health or science research.

After picking the topic of interest, the article you choose to read must be 3 pages of information. If you use the internet you must use the whole article. If you use a magazine, do not rip the article out and attach it. Just site the information at the end so we can look it up. If you get the article on-line, site it at the end of the summary.

A reaction paper is a complete summary of the topic. Typed in a 12 font. It can be double spaced or single spaced with a margin of .5". Your name and class period must be on the paper. **THE LAST PAGE OF THE SUMMARY MUST BE YOUR REACTION TO THE ARTICLE YOU CHOOSE.** Your reaction can not be "I liked the article" or "I learned a lot". Your reaction must be about what you may have learned, was there value to the article you read. Was it believable? Did it change your opinion about the topic you were interested in? The reaction is not a specific length. It can be a paragraph or longer.

The purpose is to learn something new about a topic that interests you. To broaden your outlook in the health and wellness area.

Blizzard Bag-Day 1

Research to determine your **TWO TOPICS.**

Have the topics approved

Blizzard Bag Day 2

Outline the points you will speak to in your summary.

The outlines are handed in with the final paper

Blizzard Bag Day 3

Type out the papers with emphasis on the reaction to each article

ASSIGNMENT FOR MAKE-UP OF 1 OR 2 BLIZZARD BAGS

The difference would be that **NO OUTLINE** would be required to hand in. Each student would turn in one reaction paper per blizzard bag with the same written requirements that were explained above-12 font, double or single spaced/margin of .5". Your name and class period must be on the paper. There must be a reaction to what you read, not just a summary of the article.
